ANALYSING ARGUMENT – SAMPLE INTRODUCTION

<u>Remember – your introduction should include:</u>

- □The titles/headlines of the articles and what types of text they are (opinion piece, letter to the editor, graphic/cartoon)
- The writers' names and their points of view (if evident)
- □Where and when the articles were published
- The contentions of the articles.
- □A general description of the overall tone or feel of the articles.

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Each year there seems to be a media and social media storm that erupts over individuals or groups responses to community well being issues. Last year there was a social media furore over the notion of vaccinations - whether they should be compulsory and the consequences on individuals if the choose to go unvaccinated. The article 'Anti-vaxxer NRL WAG incredibly compares herself to a HOLOCAUST victim after her husband was stood down by the league for refusing to get a flu shot' by Zoe Zaczek and Brett Lackey for Daily Mail Australia and AAP (20/5/2020) is an opinion piece that contends that the notion of comparing Rugby League players being forced to get a flu inoculation with a genocidal holocaust is nonsensical; the feature article from SBS Dateline (28/82019) entitled 'Inside Australia's Antivaccination Hotspot' is written in a neutral tone and relies primarily on personal anecdotes to explore people's opinions relating to the vaccination debate; on the other hand, the attack advertisment placed in local U.S. media (source unknown) in 2019 is decidedly supportive of the anti-vaccination movement when it asserts that there is a link between drug taking and childhood vaccinations. All three media pieces employ a different tones to reinforce their contentions.
