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VCE English Unit 3 Exam Preparation

1. KNOW "YOUR STUFF"

- 2. KNOW WHAT TO DO
- 3. KNOW WHEN TO DO IT

(... simple really, isn't it ...

...well ... seems so ... but it still means you have to work at it ...)

VCE English Unit 3 Exam Preparation: KNOW "YOUR STUFF"

This is probably the most obvious point to make, but it is also the one that often is not approached as well as it should be:

FIRST of all – there is an assumption that you have done and understood the classwork relating to <u>False Claims Of Colonial</u> <u>Thieves</u>, and Argument and persuasive language (Analysing Argument)

DO NOT JUST READ THROUGH YOUR CLASS NOTES

You should have already summarised your work down to the themes studied and quote sheets in <u>False Claims</u> ... and the PLT's for Argument and persuasive language – USE THESE AS YOUR STUDY NOTES

If you have not summarised your notes, you need to do this asap
 Please also look at the "Study hints" that are included in the next slides

VCE English Unit 3 Exam Preparation: KNOW WHAT TO DO

Structure of the Exam:

The exam is divided into three sections:

SECTION 1 – Analytical interpretation of a text 20 marks (recommended time : **1 hour**)

SECTION 2 – Argument and persuasive language20 marks(recommended time : I hour)

<u>SECTION 1:</u> Analytical interpretation of a text

Instructions for Section 1:

- Section 1 requires students to write an analytical interpretation of a selected text in response to **one** topic (either **i**. or **ii**.) on **one** text.
- Your response should be supported by close reference to the selected text.
- If your selected text is a collection of poetry or short stories, you may write on several poems or stories, or on **at least two** in close detail.
- Indicate which text you have chosen to write on and whether you have chosen to answer **i**. or **ii**.
- Your response will be assessed according to the assessment criteria set out on page XX of this book.
- Section 1 is worth one-half of the total marks for this examination.

Task:

Plan and write up a response to <u>one</u> of the prompts provided (approx. 650+ words)

STUDY HINT:

- Go over your revision/study notes (1 page per theme) for *False Claims Of Colonial Themes* & your study sheet for your first SAC
- Revisit a your quote banks (try to keep to less than 10 or so words) up to 5 per theme

SECTION 2: Argument and persuasive language

Instructions for Section 2:

- Section 2 requires students to write an analysis of the ways in which argument and language are used to persuade others to share a point(s) of view.
- Read the background information on this page and the material on pages
 XX XX, and write an analytical response to the task below.
- For the purposes of this task, the term 'language' refers to written, spoken and visual language.
- Your response will be assessed according to the assessment criteria set out on page XX of this book.
- Section 2 is worth one-half of the total marks for this examination.

To plan out and write an expository analysis of the articles supplied (approx. 650+ words)
